



Take a steam-powered ride through history

Join us for this 2 1/2 mile, 30 minute excursion on the classic White Mt. Central Railroad. Steam across the scenic Pemigewasset River and through rustic woods and into the past! The tour takes visitors on one of only three wood-burning steam Climax Locomotives still running in the world and crosses over the only standing Howe-Truss covered bridge still in use today!





YOUR ADMISSION TICKET INCLUDES:

A half hour performance with Native Trained Black Bears in ou show arena. Unmuzzled and unleashed, the bears enjoy performing at close range for you several times daily.

A 2 1/2 mile, 30 minute excursion on the White Mt. Central Railroad. A standard gauge wood-burning steam locomotive pushes you through a railroad covered bridge and along the scenic Pemigewasset River.

A guided tour through the Rustic House where the amazing Tuttle family's mysterious ways delight the young and old alike An adventure through the unknown in Merlin's Mystical Mansion

A visit to the Pemigewasset Hook and Ladder Fire House, an 1884 replica, complete with authentic horse-drawn fire equipment. Adjacent, see the beautiful Americana Building, with treasures from the early electrical, advertising, and mechanical past. Displayed in the Clark Museum are early cameras, typewriters, guns, swords, children's toys, and hotel china. At Avery's Garage you will find 3 antique autos on display along with a variety of motoring memorabilia.

Set yourself back in time with a visit to ar old fashioned ice cream parlor, the Peppermint Saloon and make yourself an ice cream delight. Dip your own candles in Jack B. Nimble's Candle Shop. Don't miss our famous Bear Show offered three times a day. These grand trained native creatures delight and dazzle the crowd with tricks and talent daily. Unmuzzled and unleashed, the bears perform at close range at 12:00, 2:00 and 4:00 O'clock. This entertaining and educational 1/2 hour show is a thrill for children of all ages. During May and June show times 12:00 and 3:00 O'clock. Shows are weather permitting.

The Bear Show at Clark's Trading Post is a tradition amongst White Mountain vacationers. Having worked with bears for over 60 years, trainer Murray Clark has long since developed a rapport and understanding with these intelligent animals and has a great affection for his fellow performers. Each performance is unique, The weather, family squabbles, audience reaction - any number of things can affect the bears attention and distract them from the task at hand. It is important to note that the bears are never forced to perform any stunt and in fact often seem to enjoy the show as much as the audience.
